Scholarship Foundation DEADLINE Tuesday ~ The Murrieta High Schools' Scholarship Foundation gives thousands of dollars away each year to outstanding college-bound seniors from our high schools. Seniors with a 3.0 cumulative overall GPA (at the end of the 1st semester of senior year), AND who have plans to attend a two or four year college, technical, trade, or a vocational school during the academic year following graduation are eligible to apply. These scholarships are based on academic achievement, accomplishments, involvement and/or merit and are presented by local merchants, school groups, organizations, and individuals in the amount of \$250 or more. All you need to do is complete the application which includes student, college and parent information, accomplishments and an essay question and include a couple of letters of recommendation. The application is now available and posted on-line on both the VMHS and MVUSD websites. The Foundation members, as well as donors, review all applications and essays to determine recipients. You have nothing to lose by applying except - MONEY FOR COLLEGE! The application deadline is Tuesday, February 15 by 4pm at the District office. Applications MUST be turned in to the district office (41870 McAlby Court in Murrieta) by that time and date, by the applicant. NO applications will be accepted at the school sites. ASVAB is FREE! You don't have to join the military to take advantage of the FREE ASVAB test, which helps students determine their strengths and areas of interest. The ASVAB, or Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery, is sponsored by the Department of Defense and is a one-day three-hour, multi-aptitude, multiple-choice exam battery (test) which is given at over 14,000 schools nationwide. The ASVAB is given on campus and consists of 9 subtests: General Science, Arithmetic Reasoning, Word Knowledge, Paragraph Comprehension, Numerical Operations, Coding Speed, Auto and Shop Information, Mathematics Knowledge, Mechanical Comprehension and Electronics Information and the scores are converted into 10 composite score areas, known as "line scores". No one passes or fails the ASVAB; scores are provided on a report called the ASVAB Student Results Sheet, with additional information to help you understand your score. The ASVAB provides scores for each of the individual subjects tested, as well as three academic composite scores; Verbal, Math, and Academic Ability; and two career exploration composite scores which can help students assess their strengths, interests and areas of improvement. Again, the ASVAB is FREE and all high school students should consider taking. If taken after high school, it costs hundreds of dollars and the closest location is in San Diego. The VMHS test dates are Feb 22 and 23. See Mrs. Kim in the College & Career Center for more information and to sign up.

Summer School 2011 With the1st semester well behind, some students may unfortunately be thinking about summer school due to a failing grade. Summer School 2011 will be held at Creekside High School (on Hayes Ave behind Thompson Middle School and Murrieta Valley High School) from June 20 through July 15 with two sessions daily: 7:30-10:45am and 11:15am-2:30pm. Attendance is critical and few absences/tardies are allowed. Courses normally offered are for those who failed 9th, 10th and 11th grade English, Algebra, Geometry, Sciences and US or World History with seniors receiving preference in order to graduate during summer. This year, Hybrid (virtual) courses will also be offered for those with failing grades. Applications are now posted on our website in the Counseling section and the deadline is May 23. See your counselor for more information.

Youth in Government Day The City of Murrieta and the MVUSD have joined together with a unique opportunity for high school juniors and seniors interested in government. The 2011 Youth in Government Day will be held on April 5-6 and is designed to provide students with an opportunity to participate in local government. Activities included will be: observing a City Council meeting, 'shadowing' city officials during their work days and working on a city project proposal for the design of the Golden Triangle which culminates in a special Youth City Council Meeting where the project proposal will be presented. Juniors or seniors must have a 2.0 GPA, no failing grades during 10/11 and must have passed the CAHSEE. A copy of the school transcript must be attached with the application, so see Guidance Techs for a Transcript Request well in advance of the application deadline of March 4. Applications and additional information are available from Mr. Fages in West Hall Admin or your social science teacher.

School Accountability Report Card Now Available On-Line ~ The annual School Accountability Report Card (SARC), which is a detailed report for the last full school year (2009-2010) has been released. Both a one-page fact sheet (Spotlight on Performance) and a detailed SARC report have been posted on both the district and the VMHS websites. These reports show individual school improvement by school year, as well as county and state averages for things like teachers, class sizes, student info, college preparation and the big one, the academic performance index or API and again this year, we jumped a whopping 14 points to a whopping API of 819 - U GO BRONCOS! Be sure to click on the school year 2009-10 - check it out under School Info and School Report Card.

Broncos and National Signing Day - Each year, National Signing Day, usually held on the first Wednesday in February, is the first day a high school senior can sign a binding National Letter of Intent for college sports. This year 26 top high school athletes from MVUSD took advantage of this high-visibility day to sign their letters of intent -12 from VMHS and 14 from MVHS - following a signing ceremony held in the VMHS Gym Foyer. Superintendent Scheer congratulated the athletes and commended them for their hard work, dedication to their sport and for their commitment to succeed in the classroom. The Broncos have four softball players who will attend college on athletic scholarships: Jenna Molina, Katie Tackett, Heidi Velk and Madison

DeMott; Running back and sprinter-jumper Jovonte Slater, one of the fastest players in SoCal, turned down offers from Army and Navy for USC; and Tisha Abrea, the Broncos' No. 1 female golfer, will fulfill her lifelong dream to play golf in college, and then, perhaps, professionally. For these students, they had things lined up and a decision made and they took advantage of making their college commitment now, but many more outstanding Bronco athletes will make similar decisions in the coming months. Congrats to all of our outstanding Bronco athletes and good luck in collegiate athletics!

CAHSEE - You Gotta Have It! The purpose of the CAHSEE (California High School Exit Examination) is to improve student achievement in high school and to help ensure that students who graduate from high school can demonstrate grade-level competency in reading, writing and mathematics - passing is a graduation requirement. Students first take the CAHSEE in the tenth grade, this year March 8-9. If they don't pass either the English/language arts or math portion, they can retake the test in the 11th or 12th grade and may retake all or part of the CAHSEE three times in their junior year and up to five times in their senior year. School districts have been giving the CAHSEE since the 2001/02 school year, however the 2005/06 year was the first that passing the test was required for graduation. The English/language arts portion of the exam measures whether a student has mastered reading and writing skills at the 9th or 10th grade level including vocabulary, writing, writing conventions, informational reading and reading literature. The math portion of the exam includes arithmetic, statistics, data analysis, probability, number sense, measurement and geometry at 6th and 7th grade levels. It also tests whether a student has mastered algebra, a subject that most students study in the 8th or 9th grade. Answers to FAQ's about this exam can be found on the CDE (CA Dept of Education) website at www.cde.ca.gov. For students wanting to prepare for these tests, even though they are cumulative knowledge tests, there are many websites supporting testing and the CDE has study guides for both Math and English - go to the CDE website under Testing & Accountability, Program Resources.

Tickets (\$45) are available on-line only from VMHS website. The No-Go List is in effect, so if you try to purchase your ticket online, you will be blocked and should see Mr. Rausa in the Discipline Office to confirm and remedy. You may owe a library book, forgotten to turn in all of your 40 hours of Community Service or have a Saturday School that needs serving - whatever you need to do, DO IT NOW! Get your ticket soon, before they are all sold out - and there are limited seats on buses. Don't miss this awesome senior event! 8th Grade Parent Night Coming... Bronco parents of incoming 9th grade students should get ready for this event, being held Monday, March 8 at 7pm in the main gym. Even if you think you know about all of this, start fresh with your incoming 9th grade student and come out and get reacquainted with Bronco pride! This event is to provide valuable information to parents of incoming freshmen about all the academic and cocurricular programs offered at VMHS. You'll hear about special programs for freshman to make their transition to high school smooth and positive, our leadership and performing arts programs, clubs and athletics. Make Those AP Payments - Deadline Approaching... AP tests will be administered from May 2-13. The College Board charges \$87 per test for administration, grading and reporting and this must be paid for each test by Friday, March 18 or the student will not be allowed to take the test. Students who are registered in an AP course and don't take the test will not get college credit and their high school grade in the course may be affected. Many students take multiple courses, so there are several test fees to pay. Test payments must be made on-line through the VMHS website with Visa, MasterCard, AmEx, Discover and debit cards being accepted. Good Luck Testing!

JROTC Outstanding Option! The Air Force Junior ROTC program is fairly new at VMHS - just celebrating it's second year. The program initially had 8 students but has grown to over 200 cadets! Colonel Matera and Master Sergeant Shoemaker opened the program and are current instructors of four levels of aerospace science courses. Junior ROTC is a unique academic and citizenship program operated under public law with support by the U.S. Air Force. There are five basic themes; aviation history, the physics of flight, space, careers after high school, and leadership. Students receive physical education credit for two years and elective credit for years three and four. Classes meet just like all other classes during the week. This is not a recruiting program, nor does a student incur any military obligation - a common misperception. However, many students do enlist in one of the military services at higher rank than their peers or apply to one the academies for an ROTC scholarship. A further explanation of the curriculum is provided in the VMHS Course Catalogue. They will be celebrating their 2nd successful year with their annual Military Ball at Pechanga later this month. Everyone knows the tune and the initial words to the Air Force theme song - 'Off we go into the wide blue yonder, climbing high into the sun' - well, there goes the Bronco AFJROTC...into the wild blue yonder, striving to be outstanding citizens! Student Spaceflight Experiments - Wow! The Student Spaceflight Experiments Program (SSEP), launched June 2010 by the National Center for Earth and Space Science Education in partnership with

NanoRacks, LLC, is a remarkable U.S. national Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) education initiative that gives up to 3,200 students across a community—middle and high school students (grades 5-12), and/or undergraduates at 2-year community colleges (grades 13-14)—the ability to design and propose real experiments to fly in low Earth orbit, first aboard the final flights of the Space Shuttle, and then on the International Space Station. SSEP is about immersing and engaging students and their teachers in real science - on the high frontier - so that students are given the chance to be scientists - and experience science firsthand. Parents You Can Make A Difference... The Calif. State Department of Alcohol and Drug Programs (ADP) prompts us that following the lead of influential adults, many young people are tempted, or even encouraged to celebrate with alcoholic drinks. According to a new Teens Today study, nearly half of high school teens say their parents allow them to drink at home. Almost 1 in 3 say they are allowed to drink to mark special occasions. The California Highway Patrol reports that DUI collisions account for one of the highest volumes of violent crimes in the state. It is helpful to talk with teens about the risks from alcohol use, especially during school breaks when there is increased spare time and socialization. Reported data also indicates that over 50% of 15-year-olds say they either drink at home or at a friend's house. However, only 31% of parents of 15-16-year-olds believe their child had a drink in the past year. ADP in partnership with The Governor's Prevention Advisory Council created a parents' guide for underage drinking titled, "Tips for Parents: Underage Drinking in Calif, What Can You Do?". This guide empowers parents to prevent teen drinking and can be an excellent tool for parents. IMPORTANTIMPORTANT***IMPORTANT***IMPORTANT*** ALL HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS - NEW MANDATORY VACCINATION REQUIREMENT

New California state legislation REQUIRES that all students entering grades 7-12 next school year must receive a Tdap (Whooping Cough/Pertussis) booster immunization before starting the 2011 school year. This means that all high school students entering grades 9-12 must have documentation of this requirement by the first day of school, which is August 10, 2011. Failure to meet the requirement will result in the student not being able to start school until proof of this vaccine has been provided to the Health Office. Avoid long lines and the wait for doctor/health office appointment times and get this done well in advance of the start of school in August. Please send/bring your student's proof of the Pertussis booster immunization to the Health Office for documentation ASAP. You can check your immunization records for the following DTap/Tdap/DTP administered on or after the 7th birthday (Td or Dt does not meet the requirement). Please note that this immunization is in addition to other DTP, DTap, or Td immunizations. Consult with your health care provider for further information. Low cost vaccines, normally about \$10 or may be covered in your family health plan, are available at Riverside County Family Care Center at Lake Elsinore Family Care Center, 2499 E. Lakeshore Drive in Lake Elsinore (1.800.720.9553) or contact the Riverside County Health Dept at 471.4200 for information on free vaccines. Facts About Adolescent Asthma ~ What triggers adolescent asthma? Asthma affects an estimated 6.8 million children under 18 years of age and is the most common chronic childhood disorder and when lungs aren't working well, there is a risk of death, so asthma is serious and should be treated with care. Prevention is the best way to avoid serious complications of an asthma attack. During an asthma attack, the airways of the lungs are narrowed which is caused by swelling of the lining of the lungs and tightening of the muscles around the airways - there may or may not be a wheezing sound. Several medications are used controlling asthma symptoms. There are also triggers to avoid, which are things that may initiate an attack such as: cold air, tobacco/wood smoke, perfume, paint, hair spray, or any strong odors or fumes, allergens (particles causing allergies) like dust mites, pollen, molds, pollution and pet/animal dander, common cold, influenza and other

respiratory illnesses. If an inhaler is carried at school we should have an authorization signed by the parent and physician in the health office. This also gives us information in case of an emergency. Visit www.aafa.org for more information about triggers and how to avoid them. Discuss asthma and it's symptoms with your healthcare professional to learn the best way to manage asthma. Asthma can be beat!
