**Course Description:** This course may be repeated multiple times for credit.

### I. Goals

The student will:

- A. Improve and master technical skills
- B. Create performances that project clear artistic expression and style
- C. Analyze choreography theory taught through the use of theme and variation, unity and rhythmic organization
- D. Analyze skills and performance levels in written form (Student and professional works)
- E. Choreograph personal performances (Personal choice and thematic)
- F. Analyze the historical and cultural evolution of dance forms
- G. Perform ballet, jazz, lyrical, musical theater, modern and ethnic forms of dance
- H. Develop a working knowledge of the skills, vocabulary and language specific to ballet, jazz, lyrical, musical theater modern and ethnic forms of dance
- I. Develop flexibility, muscle strength, dance technique and cardiovascular endurance

- J. Develop fundamental artistic and aesthetic understanding by written critique of live, video, profession and self performances
- K. Develop choreography for various dance performances throughout the year including a complete dance concert

  - 4. Evolution of dance in the 20<sup>th</sup> century
  - 5. Relationship of dance to other arts
  - 6. Impact of multi-media on dance past 50 years to present
- H. Final assessment includes cumulative evaluation from all of the above
