NEW- Changes to the FAFSA

CHANGES TO THE FAFSA PROCESS FOR 2017–18

SUBMIT A FAFSA EARLIER: Students will be able to submit a 2017–18 FAFSA as early as Oct. 1, 2016, rather than beginning on Jan. 1, 2017. The earlier submission date will be a permanent change, enabling students to complete and submit their FAFSAs as early as October 1 every year. (There is NO CHANGE to the 2016–17 schedule. The 2016–17 FAFSA became available Jan. 1, 2016.)

USE EARLIER INCOME AND TAX INFORMATION: Beginning with the 2017–18 FAFSA, students will report income and tax information from an earlier tax year. For example, on the 2017–18 FAFSA, students (and parents, as appropriate) will report their 2015 income and tax information, rather than their 2016 income and tax information.

Here's a summary of key dates for submitting the FAFSA depending on when you plan to go to school:

Getting Ready

- Before starting the FAFSA on the Web (FOTW), gather:
 - Student driver's license
 - Student Alien Registration Card, if applicable
 - Student and Parent

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- Social Security cards
- 2016 W-2 Forms and records of money earned and other taxable benefits
- 2016 federal income tax form (even if not yet completed)
- Records of untaxed income
- Current bank statements
- Business, farm, and other real estate records
- Records of stocks, bonds, and other investments
- Complete 2018-19 FOTW Worksheet (optional)
- Create a file for copies of all financial aid documents submitted





Using a FSA ID to Sign the FAFSA

- The FSA ID will allow students and parents to access and electronically sign the online version of the FAFSA with a user-selected username and password.
- This new login process will be more secure, since it eliminates the need for students and parents to provide personally identifiable information (PII), such as their name, date of birth and Social Security Number (SSN), every time they access U.S. Department of Education web sites.
- This change permits self-service password retrieval by email without requiring the applicant to reveal PII. It also allows for name changes (e.g., through marriage) without requiring an application for a new FSA ID.

Undocumented Students



- Undocumented students, while not eligible for federal aid, may want to:
 - Start inquiring in elementary and high school to see if it is possible for the student to become a permanent resident
 - Watch for changes in federal and state laws regarding the eligibility of undocumented or under-documented students
 - Consider applying for federal Deferred Action for Childhood Arrival (DACA) which allows for work authorization
 - Undocumented students applying for Cal Grants and other state aid should complete a California Dream Act Application, not the FAFSA
 - Check with colleges and universities to see if institutional financial aid is available

 - Students should apply for all scholarships for which they may be eligible





Strategies for Listing Colleges

- List a California college or university first (for Cal Grant consideration)
- Then list those schools with the earliest financial aid deadlines, regardless of whether they are in-state or out-of-state
- If the student is applying to more than ten schools, wait for the processed Student Aid Report (SAR) and add additional schools
 - via the Web, using the student FSA ID
 - By phone, using the DRN from the SAR

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

- While in the School Selection Section, the student will be asked to enter the location and name or the federal school code for each school to which he/she wants FOTW information sent
- If the student does not know the federal school code, enter the state in which the college/university is located and search for the federal school code by the college/university name

- The student will be asked to select the housing plan that best describes the type of housing the student expects to have while attending each listed school
- The choices for housing are:
 - On Campus
 - With Parent
 - Off Campus



- The student's choice of housing may affect the amount of financial aid for which he/she is eligible. It is usually more expensive to live on or off campus than with parents or relatives
- Remember, selecting the On Campus housing option is not an application for On Campus housing. Students should check with the colleges/ universities about housing information when they apply for admission





- Students will be asked to provide information about their parent tax filing status for 2016:
 - If parents have completed a 2016 federal income tax return, select "Already completed"
 - If parents have not as yet filed, but plan to file a 2016 federal income tax return, select "Will file"
 - If parents have not, nor will not, file a 2016 federal income tax return and are not required to do so, select "Not going to file"





Section 5 IRS Data Retrieval

- This question asks if parents have completed their 2016 IRS income tax return
- If parent(s) answer "Already completed," they will be given the option to transfer their 2016 income tax information directly from IRS records to the FOTW
- If parents indicate that they have recently filed their 2016 taxes, they may not be able to access their IRS data if they have filed taxes electronically within the last three weeks or by mail within the last eleven weeks
- Instead, they should use their actual 2016 IRS tax return to complete the FOTW so the student does not miss any important financial aid deadlines
