- · Take college prep English and advanced math: English (writing and critical reading) and Algebra II or advanced math.
- · Update your Academic Planner on californiacolleges.edu.
- · Do your best on the Smarter **Balanced Summative** Assessment, Your CAASPP EAP results will help determine if you are ready for college-level courses before attending the CSU. In a college-level course you earn credit towards a baccalaureate degree. Visit csusuccess.org/caaspp.
- · Register for the AP exams in the spring. You can earn college credit if you score well on the test(s).
- · Register for the PSAT exam if you didn't take it in 10th grade.
- · Take the SAT or ACT in the spring as an additional way to determine if you are ready for college-level courses. Many CSU campuses require you to take the SAT/ACT by October of

COLLEGE **ADMISSION TIMELINE**

FRESHMAN YEAR

- Take challenging courses.
- Aim for As and Bs in all of your courses.
- Focus on your classwork and your homework to develop the study skills you will need to succeed in college.
- Join clubs, play sports and volunteer.
- Take elective courses that interest you and that meet the CSU/UC's admission requirements such as music, art, theater, or a foreign language.

SOPHOMORE YEAR

- Continue to take challenging courses
- Take the PSAT 10
- Keep your grades up...no "D's or F's"
- Take courses from the "A-G" course list:

History,

English,

Math,

Visual and Performing Arts,

Lab Science and

Foreign Language

JUNIOR YEAR

- Challenge yourself to take the most rigorous course you can
- Take the PSAT Oct. 11th...\$25 to bookkeeper
- Register to take SAT/ACT in the Spring
- Register to take AP/IB exams
- Fix any "D" grades before the start of Senior Year

SENIOR YEAR

- Register and take SAT or ACT exams by the end of December 2017
- Apply for FAFSA on October 1
- CSU (23 campus) application window October 1-November 30
- UC (9 campus) application window November 1-November 30
- Private, Independent, and Out of State schools have different application windows

HOW DOES FINANCIAL AID WORK? SHOULD I FILL OUT A FAFSA?



Experts agree one of the most common reasons students don't fill out the FAFSA is because they believe their parents make too much money, so they won't qualify.

This is a costly misconception. "Everyone should fill out the FAFSA, because everyone is eligible for some form of financial aid, no matter their circumstances,"

Most financial aid in the U.S. is awarded by universities rather than the government, and you usually can't qualify for need-based or merit-based aid without a FAFSA on file. It's important to be aware that many colleges offer merit-based aid that doesn't even consider financial need; it's based on achievements such as grades, SAT scores or athletics. In other words, the amount of money your parents make doesn't matter for this type of aid, but you can't get it if you don't fill out the form.

PSAT 10 PSAT/NMSQT

The Preliminary SAT, also known as the PSAT/NMSQT® (National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test), is a preparatory version of the SAT exam. You can only take the PSAT once per year, and most students take the test in both 10th and 11th grade.

On October 11th (College and Career Kickoff)

- -The PSAT 10 will be given district wide to <u>all 10th grade students</u>. There is no cost and no need to sign up.
- -11th grade students will have an opportunity to take the PSAT/NMSQT exam. They are required to sign up with the bookkeeper. The cost for Juniors taking the PSAT/NMSQT is \$25

SAT AND ACT TEST

SAT

- Scored on scale 400-1600
- Aptitude Test: measures reasoning and verbal abilities
- 3 components: Math, Reading, Writing
- Limited use of calculator
- Go to Collegeboard.org to register

ACT

- Scored on 1-36 Scale
- Achievement Test: measures what a student has learned
- 5 components: Math Reading, English, & Science
- Can use calculator
- Go to ACT.org to register

ASVAB

The ASVAB(Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery) is a multiple-aptitude battery that measures developed abilities and helps predict future academic and occupational success in the military. It is administered annually to more than one million military applicants, high school, and post-secondary students. Most students who take this test do not join the military. The ASVAB gives some really great feedback about students aptitudes, which helps in post secondary planning.... What are you good at?

The ASVAB is given one time a year / It is free / sign up in Counseling
