# English 101 — 4 units

English Composition 101-12th grade

- English 101 is an introductory composition course that provides instruction in writing academic analytic essays.
- Students learn to interpret and respond to sources analytically, conduct academic-level research through college databases, and incorporate those sources into argumentative essays and research papers.

In this semester course, students will be writing *several research-based essays and one full research paper*. Each essay will focus on a specific writing mode/genre which provides the basics for writing in college courses across the curriculum.

This course also helps students develop critical reading skills to analyze specific writing techniques and strategies to improve their own writing.

# English 103 — 4 units

English 103: Critical Thinking and Writing

\* Prerequisite: A grade of C or higher in English 101 or

AP Language and Composition test score of 4 or 5

\* Catalogue Description: This course provides continuing practice in the analytic writing begun in English 101. The course develops critical thinking, reading, and writing skills as they apply to the analysis of written texts (literature and/or non-fiction) from diverse cultural sources and perspectives. The techniques and principles of effective written argument as they apply to the written text will be emphasized. Some research is required.

# Biology 134 — 3 units





Biology 134Human Heredity and Evolution

This is an introductory course in basic human genetics and evolution. This course introduces students to central theories of the biological sciences using the chemical and biological aspects of human genetics as its main theme. In addition, students are introduced to the political, philosophical and ethical implications of human heredity and evolution. This course is not intended for biology majors.



### College Algebra 105 (4) / Precalculus 110 (5)

- College Algebra and Pre-Calculus will fulfill the first 2 classes of the sequence for STEM majors. They are fast paced, rigorous, and a challenge for most students.
- College Algebra covers all the algebraic concepts from Math 1, 2, and 3 (or up to Algebra 2) but on a much deeper and abstract level.
- Students report that they feel better prepared for the SAT after taking College Algebra.

# Chemistry 100 – 4 units

CHEM 100 is a course that explores the physical and chemical properties of common chemicals and compounds. This course fulfills the general education requirement for a physical science with laboratory at most four-year colleges and universities.

It's geared for NON-SCIENCE MAJORS- if you think you are going to major in science you can still take this class, you'll just receive college elective credit instead of science credit - you WILL still have to take chemistry in college!

### U.S. History 111 – 3 units / 112 – 3 units

- •HIST 111 and 112 are introductory history courses that survey the political, social, economic, geographical, and intellectual developments in the United States. HIST 111 spans from Ancient America through Reconstruction, and HIST 112 covers Reconstruction to modern times.
- •During the semester, students will be held to collegelevel standards and are expected to take rigorous and comprehensive examinations, as well as complete analytical essays (both at home and in class) that explore different texts and topics covered in the course.

### U.S. History 111 - 3 units / 112 - 3 units

History 111/112 online will blend the rigor of face-to-face instruction with the flexibility of an online course. The course offers similar content, instruction, assessments, feedback, and interaction as the face-to-face course. Each week the course includes lecture videos of direct instruction from Mrs. Fuette, a multiple-choice quiz, interactive responses, and a virtual discussion. There will be two short Term Papers, and a Midterm and Final Exam.

The pilot-year has proven successful for Vista students with 100-students taking the course and and a 98% passing rate. The online class with allow students to learn both content and tools necessary to thrive in today's technological age while earning 6-units of college

### Music 100 – 3 units

Introduction and Appreciation of Music LEC 48-54 This course provides students with a survey of European music, tracing its development through the Middle Ages, Baroque, Classical, Romantic, and Contemporary eras. The purpose of the course is to cultivate an understanding of the basic elements of music and their combination into various forms, styles, and genres, while encouraging the appreciation of musical aesthetics and enjoyment of music from multiple historical periods.

### ASL 101 - 4 units / ASL 201 - 3 units

In our Dual Enrollment American Sign Language (ASL) classes, students have the chance to communicate in and understand another language while familiarizing themselves with the community and culture of the target language group. Students are exposed to a variety of learning situations to increase their understanding of American Sign Language and Deaf culture. Audiovisual, online resources, and actual experiences in the Deaf community are used extensively to help students develop their ASL skills. In our voices-off full immersion class, students build on previous language knowledge and become near fluent signers by the end of the program. First semester is technically ASL 2 which is a great review semester and chance for students to adjust to the rigor and pace of the college course. Second semester will be ASL 3 and students will learn new words and phrases, and work on fluency of language. Anyone who scored "standard met" or higher on the English Language Arts part of the CASSPP can take a "bi literate" test and earn a seal of biliteracy on their diploma during the Spring of their Dual Enrollment class.

- Complete Online Orientation
- Turn in Student Parent Agreement Form "SPA" form
- Make sure you write down your MSJC ID number, you will need to know it!

- Current DE students will only need to turn in SPA form and make sure account balance is clear.
- If you skipped a semester students must schedule a time in career center to update their MSJC application and complete orientation
- Schedule a time with Mrs. Rausa, Career Center no later than April 19th!
- Sign Up Genius link will be sent on Remind App

### Registration Process cont.:

- •Once SPA forms become available (MSJC provided) students will have 1 week to turn in forms. Deadlines will be strictly enforced. Turn in to EAST HALL, Mrs. Whitaker.
- Students <u>MUST</u> write their <u>MSJC ID</u> number on their form prior to submitting their form(s) or it will not be accepted!
- Selection may consist of a "lottery based system"

### Registration Process cont.:



• Forms are turned in to MSJC for approvals – they will make sure students have completed matriculation process.

 Bronco Round Up (summer) students will be provided with section numbers to register for courses.

Students are responsible to register for classes.
