Readiness Activities

Alphabet Skills:

- •Exposure to letters: (Teach lowercase letters before uppercase letters!)
- ·Start slow
- ·Experience is the goal, not mastery . . yet
- ·Keep it fun!

Phonemic Awareness:

- ·Exposure to oral language
- ·Rhyming skills
- ·Play with words and language
- ·Dr. Seuss books

Read, Read, and Read Some More:

- •Reading with your child is SO IMPORTANT!
- •Discuss stories (predict what will happen next, ask questions, talk about the story and pictures)
- •Remember that re-reading the same book is OK
- ·Visit the library on a regular basis

Oral Language Development:

- •Talk to your child: Ask them questions about their day. Who did you play with? What did you do? <u>Teach them to answer in complete sentences</u>, i.e. I played with Joey and Susie today in the backyard.
- •When reading Have them retell the story or a part of it using as much detail possible. Ask questions to get them to add more details, i.e. Where was the cat?

Writing Skills:

- ·Work on building up hand muscles to prepare for writing success
- •Show your child how to use writing daily: making lists, writing thank you cards, labeling containers in the pantry, etc.
- •Encourage your child to begin labeling or writing words to add to their pictures.

Tracing and Cutting Skills:

- ·Work on correct pencil and scissor grip
- ·Provide child-size scissors
- ·Work on cutting away from the body

Number Knowledge:

- ·Expose to numbers
- ·Count objects in environment

Colors and Shapes:

- ·10 basic colors and 4 basic shapes
- ·Real world experiences

Social Development:

- ·Interact with other children
- ·Take direction from adults other than parents
- ·Focus on an activity for at least 10 minutes
- ·Have a positive attitude about school
- ·Make a non-tearful break from parents
- ·Handle bathroom activities by him/herself
