Highlights & Achievements:

- Rail Ranch strives to embrace rigorous academic standards, providing excellence and creativity in teaching, and for creating a positive school climate during this year of virtual learning. The goal is to maintain equity and ensure all students have access to the technology.
- CAASPP testing for the 19-20 school year was cancelled due to nationwide school shutdowns due to the COVID Pandemic. Multiple measures of student ability have been implemented this year. Virtual testing through iReady in Language Arts and Math provided a baseline for student ability.
- Rail Ranch has two onsite parent groups that meet virtually. We have our African American Parent Advisory Council and our Latin Parent Advisory Council where information is shared, and parent input is gathered in regards to the decisions made about Rail Ranch.
- Our Learning Center instructional model provides additional instructional support to students in kindergarten through fifth grade virtually. Specialists reach out to students virtually and provide small group instruction virtual. Rail currently has three small cohorts onsite for the underserved students in Special Education and unengaged students.
- All Professional Learning Communities are focused on engaging all students in the virtual learning environment.
- Our Visual and Performing Arts programs are offered virtually. Students participate in online band instruction, choir, and the Arts. Our first grade students attended a virtual play performed by Murrieta Valley High School. Our fourth grade students participate in recorder instruction weekly.

The counselor provides Talk Tuesdays virtually for students to join and socialize with one another. Parents and teachers are encouraged to send weekly virtual shout outs to their students to be viewed at our virtual Friday Morning Sing.

All teachers provide office hours for parents to discuss any concerns.

Rail Ranch Elementary School opened in 1989 as the third elementary school in the Murrieta Valley Unified School District. Rail Ranch Elementary has 39 classrooms, a library, a multipurpose room, administrative offices, two play areas, and a childcare room. We have ample space for the number of students enrolled at the school. When the school reaches capacity, new students may be assigned to other schools in the district where classroom space exists.

Upkeep, maintenance, and cleaning of district schools are provided by the district. Schools and rest rooms are cleaned daily. District maintenance staff maintains the landscaping. Corrective and preventative maintenance are scheduled on a routine basis to keep the school in good repair. Work order requests assigned through a computerized work order system ensure that emergency repairs are given the highest priority.

Opportunities for Parental Involvement (School Year 2020-21)

Murrieta Valley Unified School District is committed to collaborating with parents and providing opportunities for engagement. Parents are encouraged to attend school assemblies, events and parent-teacher conferences virtually. Parent and community involvement is encouraged through PTA and the School Site Council (SSC). Rail Ranch also has an English Language Parent Coffee/DELAC meeting once a month to provide our non-English speaking parents an opportunity to ask questions about school programs and any paperwork sent home. At the meetings interpreters are provided for languages such as Farsi, Arabic, Tagalog, Spanish, and Vietnamese. Rail Ranch also provides a parent English Language Acquisition class on site. The parents are eager to participate and feel this is a way to help their children academically.

The PTA is actively involved virtually in Red Ribbon Week, Reflections, Character Counts assemblies, book fairs, and activities to enhance school and community spirit, as well as reward and incentive programs. Our School Site Council includes three parents and three staff members that provide input on decisions for our students. Parent volunteers must attend an annual volunteer training and have a current RAPTOR/ Megan's Law evaluation file with the front office. This year, PTA will do a virtual Read a thon that will encourage students to keep reading.

Lastly, MVUSD continues to be deliberate in its efforts to engage parents of diverse backgrounds and to obtain feedback regarding each student's academic journey, emotional supports and engagement within their school site. MVUSD parents are invaluable partners and each parent group is comprised of dedicated parents who are steadfast in promoting strategic efforts to support student learning and college/career readiness. Group opportunities for parents are; Action Team Partnership (ATP), African American Parent Advisory Council (AAPAC), Latino Parent Advisory Council (LPAC), District English Learner Advisory Council (DELAC) and Special Education Parent Advisory Council (SEPAC). Additionally, our school sites offer a variety of student and parent groups including: School Site Council (SSC), English Learner Advisory Council (ELAC), principal/student advisory groups, PTA/PTSA/PTO and staff leadership teams.

School Safety Plan (School Year 2020-2021)

School safety is a high priority at Rail Ranch Elementary. Administrators, teachers, and aides monitor the campus, supervise the students, and ensure a safe learning environment. School resource officers are available to respond to the school if assistance is needed. Rail Ranch Elementary is a closed campus that is fully fenced. Visitors and volunteers must report to the office for permission to be on campus. We utilize the Raptor Visitor Management System to monitor parent volunteers on campus to ensure all volunteers are screened against California's Megan's Law database as well as all 50 states' sex offender databases. Video surveillance cameras across our campus are a deterrent to trespassers, vandalism and other illegal activities. They also help administrators with discipline issues and help with the investigation of any crimes that occur on campus during the school day or after school hours, making our school safer and more secure.

The district holds monthly virtual safety meetings and our School Site Council (SSC) works on our Safety Plan throughout the year. We adopted a Comprehensive School Safety Plan that we review annually; our last review took place in December 2020. The plan is presented to all staff and parents, and we hold numerous student assemblies to address safety issues.

The district has a strictly enforced anti-discrimination policy that prohibits harassment of students or staff based on race, gender, disability, religion, or sexual orientation.

To prepare for emergencies, evacuation drills are conducted regularly throughout the school year, and our school actively participates in the statewide Great Shakeout. In addition, our school has an Emergency and Disaster Preparedness Plan that aligns with the federal NIMS emergency system. The plan specifies procedures for dealing with fire, flood, earthquakes, lock downs, hazardous materials, disaster recovery organization, and student accountability following a disaster. In the event of an emergency or urgent situation, our school uses a computerized calling system through Aeries Communication, to immediately notify all families of an emergency via email, phone call, text and app alerts. Schools are currently closed due to the Corona Pandemic. Once onsite learning resumes, regularly schedule drills will be reinstated.

During the 2019-2020 school year, Murrieta Valley USD continued to provide professional development to support teachers and staff in delivering high quality learning for our students. During the spring closure for schools, district employees were offered a week-long professional development series focused on virtual learning skills and resources. All trainings centered around engagement strategies and 21st Century digital skills necessary to instruct students virtually. In addition, ongoing asynchronous and weekly live trainings were offered throughout the year to all staff.

As MVUSD prepared to strengthen teachers' online instructional pedagogy for the 2020-21 school year, teachers and administrators were provided access to the Leading-Edge Certification program, which is a 30-hour online course in robust virtual learning skills and strategies. During the summer, MVUSD provided opportunities for teachers to prepare for the upcoming school year focused on providing quality virtual instruction and mitigating learning loss for students in a virtual environment. Additionally, the student calendar was adjusted to move two professional development days to the beginning of the school year for intensive training on the implementation of our new learning management system (Canvas). All teachers take part in monthly virtual staff meetings that are used for training, community building, and communication.

New teachers are provided support and the opportunity to clear their credential through the district's Teacher Induction Program, which takes them through a rigorous and reflective learning process with the help of a mentor teacher. All teachers who are new to the district also receive three days of training to learn about key focus areas, as well as district expectations and procedures.

Types of Services Funded

The district provides a wide array of programs to meet the needs of our diverse student body. This includes programs to identify and support students and their families through times of crisis and stress. A health technician, nurse, and psychologist are also available to meet with students and their families virtually and by appointment in-person.

The district provides a full-time counselor to our school to support social-emotional and academic success. Counselors teach guidance lessons and facilitate small groups on social skills, anger management, grief, and loss and provide support to military-connected students. They also provide individual responsive services, interventions, and referrals on an as-needed basis. During distance learning, our counselors have provided virtual "Counseling Corner", videos and office hours to assist students, families, and staff in need.

24/7 tutoring was implemented through Paper.co for all students in grades 4-12. This online 24/7 service is free to students, in lieu of in-person homework clubs, and before/after-school tutoring programs. Extended learning opportunities during the summer break continues to provide additional support for students who need assistance with basic curriculum.

DataQuest

DataQuest is an online data tool located on the CDE DataQuest web page at <https://dq.cde.ca.gov/dataquest/> that contains additional information about this school and comparisons of the school to the district and the county. Specifically, DataQuest is a dynamic system that provides reports for accountability (e.g., test data, enrollment, high school graduates, dropouts, course enrollments, staffing, and data regarding English learners).
