Classification - The Narwhal is classified as a mammal. It is listed under the family of whales and dolphins. Also known as the toothed whale because of it long ivory tusk.

Habitat - The Narwhal whale lives in ice cold waters of the Arctic seas, mostly in Greenland to mid-

eastern Canada. Rarely do they wander away from ice.



Size - Male Narwhal whales can reach up to 16 feet. They weigh about 1.8 tons. The female whale is slightly smaller, averaging about 13 feet and weighing about 1 ton.

Food - Narwhals have a very simple diet. They like to eat shrimp, squid, fish and other small marine animals. If caught of guard the Narwhal will be a nice meal for polar bears, Orcas, sharks and walruses.

Young - A female narwhal gives birth about every 3 years to one calf. The female is pregnant for 10-16 months, from the months of April to July of the next year. The calves are born without spots. The calf will nurse for about 4 months after birth.
