Homes: The Apache Indians lived in huts called wickiups. They could move their houses from place to place. They were made out of twigs and brush, and the women always made the houses. They lived in small groups of five to ten families. They shared jobs and food. They moved whenever the animals they hunted moved or when the seasons changed. Their homes were close to water and were safe from surprise attacks.

Clothing: Apache women made the clothes all by themselves. In the early times, they used animal skins and in later times, they used European cloths. Women wore fringed skirts, and the men dressed in breechcloths. These clothes were worn like a diaper. The men and women wore knee-high shoes called moccasins. The toes of the moccasins were turned upward, yet they were very sturdy.
